





4 MESSAGE FROM THE COUNCIL —

We are proud to present the 2019 Annual Report. Delivering on the promise to youth and parents for our more than 15,800 Scouts and their families is paramount to all of us in the Mid-America Council. With exciting changes on the horizon for Scouting, we closed out another fun-filled year.

Our vision of providing unparalleled experiences for more youth still holds true, however we have expanded this vision to include unparalleled experiences at the unit level. We introduced 22 female Scout BSA troops throughout the council. Added 2,951 new Scouts and their families into our organization. Our council sent 34 youth and adults to the World Jamboree at the Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia. 286 Scouts earned the Eagle rank; 594 Cub Scouts earned Arrow of Light. The nature program at Camp Amikaro built over 150 natural fish habitats that were placed in the LSSR lake at the end of the summer. More than 1,350 youth attended Camp Cedars with 45 females attending. 608 youth attended Camp Amikaro. 5,371 merit badges were completed at Camp Cedars. 483 Cub Scouts participated in Day Camp and many Scouts caught their first fish
