Growth! In 2022 we grew membership in our organization for the first time in several years. The families that have stayed with us through the pandemic and the National Organizations restructuring see the value in what our programs offer. There are several great things to share in this year's report and they are all due to the dedicated volunteers that deliver Scouting with their local charter partner. I'm also proud of our team that supports the thousands of volunteers across the Council. Scouting is making a difference in our communities daily!

As you see in this report, the Mid-America Council saw growth in advancement with 222 new Eagle Scouts. Our camping program saw growth and earned ACA-Accredited® Camp status from the American Camp Association®. Camp Cedars is the only Boy Scouts of America camp in Nebraska and lowa with this certification. Additionally, we had growth in popcorn sales, returning more than \$1 million to units, and with prizes - units received 54% of total sales. There is not another council our size reinvesting in unit programming at this level.

In 2023, I challenge you to invite a friend or family in your neighborhood to join Scouting. A personal invitation from you has a big impact on someone's decision to join. We can grow our impact on youth in our communities, but it's going to take us all inviting people to try our program. YOU make Scouting possible in our community. 

LITTLE SIOUX TRIBUTE

Nestled within the Loess Hills of western lowa, Little Sioux Scout Ranch has been the backdrop for thousands of Scouting adventures. The property was deeded to the Mid-America Council in 1968 by Grace and Ernest Hundahl, a Mutual of Omaha area director. The hills quickly became a home to the young men and women served by Scouting.

On August 17, 1972, LSSR hosted the Amikaro-Jamboree, a Scouting celebration, with more than 1,000 Scouts, Explorers, and friends. The property was dedicated to the Hundahl's for their significant contribution and commemorated with a time capsule to be opened 50 years later. Marking the date, the time capsule was dug up during a small celebration in August 2022. Found inside was a leadership roster, badges and pins, an annual report, and photos.

As we remember the last 50 years of Scouting history at the camp, we prepare for a new era of partnership in program. The Gillwell Foundation, a subordinate organization who own Mid-America Council Scouting properties and assets, has sold Little Sioux Scout Ranch to the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation. Because of the relationship forged with the INHF, Scouts and families will have access to Little Sioux Scout Ranch for generations to come. The history of the camp will be preserved, as well as the memorial to the four boys that lost their lives at camp in 2008.
